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Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports:

Laurel Meadow Elementary School is proud to be a PBIS School. What this means is we emphasize a schoolwide system of supports that includes defining, teaching, and supporting appropriate student behaviors to create a positive school environment. All students at LMES have been provided with instruction, modeling, and practice with appropriate behaviors in classroom settings, as well as in non-classroom settings (hallways, cafeteria, etc.).

It is important to teach positive social behavior, rather than just react to misbehavior. It is more effective to teach behavioral expectations and reward students for following them than to wait for a misbehavior to occur. Our four expectations at LMES are: Be Safe, Be Respectful, Be Responsible, and Be Ready to Learn. Students have worked with their teachers to develop matrices of what each of these expectations look like in the different areas of the school.

Laurel Meadow staff has opted to reward students with Class Loot. Focus on the group of students, rather than an individual, strengthens our sense of community. Students set a goal; for example, "if we get 10 Class Loot certificates, we get 15 minutes of extra recess."

I would like to thank you for your support. Students at Laurel Meadow are very safe, respectful, and responsible. With your help, we have students who are ready to learn!



Tardy Bell Rings at 8:00:


This is a reminder that the tardy bell rings at 8:00 a.m. Tardiness has a negative impact on learning outcomes on the tardy student, as well as the other students. When students arrive, even a few minutes late, they miss out on activities designed to build connections with their peers, potentially impacting their social interactions during Morning Meeting and creating a sense of alienation from their classmates.

When students arrive late, they receive fewer hours of instruction than students who are in class at the

ring of the bell. Students who are late miss out on important announcements, team-building, and academic activities. Arriving late also establishes bad punctuality habits and disrupts the learning of the other students.

LMES Lions are counting on you to get them to school on time. Thank you for having students here between 7:30 and 7:55 so that they can be in their classes when the bell rings at 8:00. Being on time ensures the Lions are RESPECTFUL, RESPONSIBLE, and READY TO LEARN.

Store all household products out of children's sight and reach.


Let's face it, sometimes kids get into things that they probably shouldn't. Here are a few tips to keep little explorers from finding their way into household items that could be dangerous. But just in case, we'll also show you what to do if your child accidentally ingests something harmful.

The Hard Facts

Half of the 2 million calls to Poison Help Number in 2011 involved children ages 5 and under. In fact, 9 out of 10 poisonings occur at home.

Top Tips

- 1. Store all household products and cleaning solutions out of children's sight and reach. Young kids are often eye-level with items under the kitchen and bathroom sinks.
- 2. Store poisonous items out of reach or use safety locks on cabinets within reach. These items also include liquid packets for the laundry and dishwasher. It only takes a few minutes, and it gives you one less thing to worry about.
- 3. Read product labels to find out what can be hazardous to kids. Dangerous household items include makeup, personal care products, plants, pesticides, lead, art supplies, alcohol and carbon monoxide.
- 4. Make sure that all medications, including vitamins and adult medicines, are stored out of reach and out of sight or children.
- 5. Put the toll-free number Poison Help Number (1-800-222-1222) into your home and cell phones. You should also post it near your phone or on your refrigerator for the babysitter. Hopefully you'll never need it, but it's nice to have just in case.
- Check for lead-based paint. Remove any 6. peeling paint or chewable surfaces painted with lead-based paint.
