

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


March is National Music in Our Schools Month and National Youth Art Month

Did you know there is a rich body of evidence that suggests that education in art and music boosts children's academic performance? Children learn better when music and art are part of the curriculum. Memory and spatial learning, as well as literacy and verbal intelligence have been shown to strongly benefit from musical training. Art helps with spatial learning, fine motor development, and critical thinking.

Both art and music education have also been shown to increase students' selfconfidence and creative thinking. Students who are actively engaged in music and art curricula are more likely to stay in school and stay focused on learning. Arts programs also help students with decision making, focus, and impulse control. Perseverance, collaboration, and accountability are all strengthened when students participate in the arts. Not to mention...music and art help us all express things that cannot be expressed otherwise.

### Head Lice: What Parents Need to Know

Head lice are a common problem that usually affects school-aged children and their families. Head lice can attach to the hair of anyone's head. Getting head lice is not related to cleanliness of the person. Head lice are wingless and do not fly, hop, or crawl long distances. Head lice is spread through direct head to head contact. Though head lice may be a nuisance, they don't cause serious illness or carry any diseases.

Hanover County Public Schools Guidelines: (page 6 in the Parent-Student Handbook)

Students will be excluded from school at the time a live infestation is discovered.

• The school nurse will give the parent/guardian instructions for treating lice and the removal of nits (lice eggs).

After lice treatment is completed, a parent must accompany the child to the clinic and bring the completed Head Lice Treatment Verification Form. If no live lice are seen the child will return to class.

The parent will need to continue to remove nits from the child's hair for 7 - 10 days and possibly longer.

The school nurse will follow-up with the parent/guardian in 7 - 10 days to remind them of a second treatment and to return the Head Lice Treatment Verification Form.

The school nurse will screen the student 7-10 days to determine if any live lice or nits are present.

Siblings of the infested individual and identified close contacts will be screened when deemed appropriate.

In Elementary school if more than one case of lice is identified within 7-10 days all students in the classroom will be screened and a letter will be sent home to notify parents.

### **Prevention:** Avoid head to head contact.

Avoid sharing jackets, clothing, combs, brushes, hats, barrettes, helmets, or towels.

**Treatment:** Treat with appropriate lice treatment. Retreat in 7-10 days.

- Comb after treatment and every day for at least 10 days using a nit comb.
- Wash all bedding, hats, jackets, brushes, and stuffed animals in hot water and dry on high heat.
- Items that cannot be washed should be bagged for 2 weeks.
- Vacuum the floor and all furniture.
- Notify any family/ friends who have come in close contact with the child.

 $\cdot$  Think about a favorite article of clothing. Draw a picture of it, and label the details that visually appeal to you.


 $\cdot$  Choose a favorite item at home. Study it, and describe every aspect of the way it looks. Note its color, size, shape, and location.

· Make a T-chart labeled "Morning" and

"Afternoon." Mindfully observe outside your home. Make notations about what went on there in the morning and the afternoon.
